Busy Summer Ahead

As we move into summer, Beale Air Force Base is a hive of activity!

June 7th and 8th will be the Beale Air Show, celebrating 70 Years at 70,000 feet. This year celebrates the 70-year anniversary of the U-2 Dragon Lady, a Cold War icon that is still doing

yeoman's work in our reconnaissance efforts around the world. It's been slated for retirement numerous times but, to paraphrase Mark Twain, rumors of its death have been greatly exaggerated. It's supposed to fully retire in only



four months but events around the world continue to demand America's attention. So, we'll see where things go. For my money, I'll believe the U-2 is retired when I see the last one fly away.

There will be a military-only Air Show on June 6th for those of you who are retirees and who have retiree or retiree dependent ID cards. That day will not be open to the general public, it is for military ID card holders only. If you want to avoid the crowds and see the show under more manageable conditions, Friday is a good day to go.

The big announcement at Beale this spring was that the Collaborative Combat Aircraft unmanned mission will be coming here. Beale will be the home of the YQF-42A and YQF-44A, combat drones that will take us into the next phase of air warfare. They will be on display at the Air Show if you want to see them in person. These, along with some other emerging missions, are part of the 900-person plus-up that Beale is expecting in the coming years. Although airplanes come and go, the need for actionable

Beale to Host Drone Wingmen Aircraft Readiness Unit

The U.S. Air Force announced in April it has selected Beale Air Force Base to host the service's first "Aircraft Readiness Unit" dedicated to its future fleet of drone wingmen.

The drones, dubbed Collaborative Combat Aircraft (CCA), have also begun ground testing ahead of a first flight expected this summer, the Air Force said in a press release.

"Starting ground tests is a key milestone for the CCA Increment 1 program," Air Force Chief of Staff Gen.

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David Allvin said in the release. "This phase bridges the gap between design and flight, reducing integration risks, boosting confidence, and laving the



groundwork for a successful first flight and eventual fielding to the warfighter."

General Atomics and Anduril, whose drone prototypes are respectively dubbed the YFQ-42A and YFQ-44A, are facing off for the Air Force program after their selection by the service last year. At least one of the prototypes is expected to head into production for the program's first tranche or "increment," although other firms are also able to compete for the opportunity.

New Museum Opened on National Medal of Honor Day

This year's National Medal of Honor Day, which was Tuesday, March 25, was marked by the formal opening of a museum dedicated to the medal in



Arlington, Texas.

Some of the museum

exhibits include "From Rails to Rotors," which focuses on Vietnam-era rescues with the Huey helicopter and features a virtual reality experience that simulates such a rescue; "More Than a Medal," which shows the life stories of medal recipients; and interactive exhibits that let visitors ask recipients questions virtually.

Museum tickets go for \$30 apiece, though they can be upgraded to include the VR experience or the VIP Guided Tour. The National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation operates the museums and is funded through private donations.

While the Medal of Honor was first presented in 1863, a national day for the honor and its recipients was not declared until 1990. About 3,500 of the medals have been awarded, of which over 600 were awarded posthumously, according to the Congressional Medal of Honor Society. Over 1,500 of the medals, nearly 43%, were given for service in the Civil War. There are only 61 living recipients today.

Norb Budzinski

Norb was attending Western Michigan University in the fall of 1958, hiding from the draft board along with several other 20-year-old students, when they were discovered. Greetings! One enterprising member of the group had learned about the Air Force Aviation Cadet Training Program in which a recruit with two years of college credits and the ability to pass the aptitude test and the flight physical



could be admitted to the Air Force pilot or navigator school. For Norb and a number like him, this Air Force program sounded like an OK option. He volunteered for navigator school.

As classes at Western ended in the spring, Norb and a few friends headed for aviation cadet preflight training at Lackland AFB. After 12 weeks, the survivors transferred to

Harlingen AFB and commenced navigator training. About half of those completing the preflight training at Lackland went on to pilot school in Texas, Arizona, Oklahoma, Alabama, or Florida.

Following navigator training in July 1960, Norb was assigned to a series of follow-on training schools to become combat ready. He was assigned to bomb navigator computer training in the B-52 systems at Mather AFB for 8 months; B-52 ground school at Castle AFB for 3 weeks; B-52 flight training at Walker AFB for 12 weeks; and aircrew survival training at Stead AFB for 3 weeks. He was then assigned to K. I. Sawyer AFB in the fall of 1961 for permanent duty.

Norb was a member of a 6-man crew on a B-52H. He became combat ready, went on ground alert, and flew several airborne alert missions. He spent six

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years at Sawyer and became enthused with the idea of an Air Force career.

While looking for careerbroadening opportunities, Norb applied for the SR-71 aircraft program at Beale AFB, was accepted, and spent four



years flying recon missions, much of the time TDY from Beale.

After this, he was selected for an assignment to Air Command and Staff College at Maxwell AFB. After graduation, he was selected for a Southeast Asia tour at U-Tapao Airfield, Thailand, in bomber operations. He was a planner and operations mission director. He was on this assignment in December 1972 when Operation Linebacker II, the bombing of North Vietnam, took place.

Norb returned to the states in July 1973 and was assigned again to Beale AFB, this time as an intelligence officer. Talk about career broadening! Fortunately, he was given a job involving hardware and collection systems. He then volunteered to work in the Wing Aircraft Maintenance Division where he held the positions of squadron maintenance officer, OMS commander, and maintenance control officer.

Norb retired in July 1984 as a lieutenant colonel with 25 years of active duty.

USPS Unveils 250th Anniversary Stamps Honoring Military Branches

The U.S. Postal

Service is honoring three of the nation's military branches — the Army, Navy and Marine Corps with commemorative stamps to mark 250 years of service.

Each of the three stamps features the respective name of the military service, the service seal and the inscriptions "250 Years of Service," "Since 1775" and "Forever/USA." The three military-themed commemorations are in the "Forever" class of postage and can be used to send a one-ounce first-class letter, regardless of the current price of first-class postage, according to the release.

Providing a personal note, Lt. Gen. Paul Rock Jr. director of Marine Corps staff, shared how the USPS has played a role in his military service.

"I still have letters that my wife wrote me when I was a young first lieutenant overseas on my first

shipboard deployment, and I cherish the pictures that came through the mail from my children the first time I went to war — precious memories made



possible by the U.S. Postal Service," Rock said.

"That connection remains strong to this day, and I thank the USPS for helping us share this great milestone with all Americans. These stamps will travel around the world and across our nation, carrying with them the message of patriotism, service and unwavering dedication."
